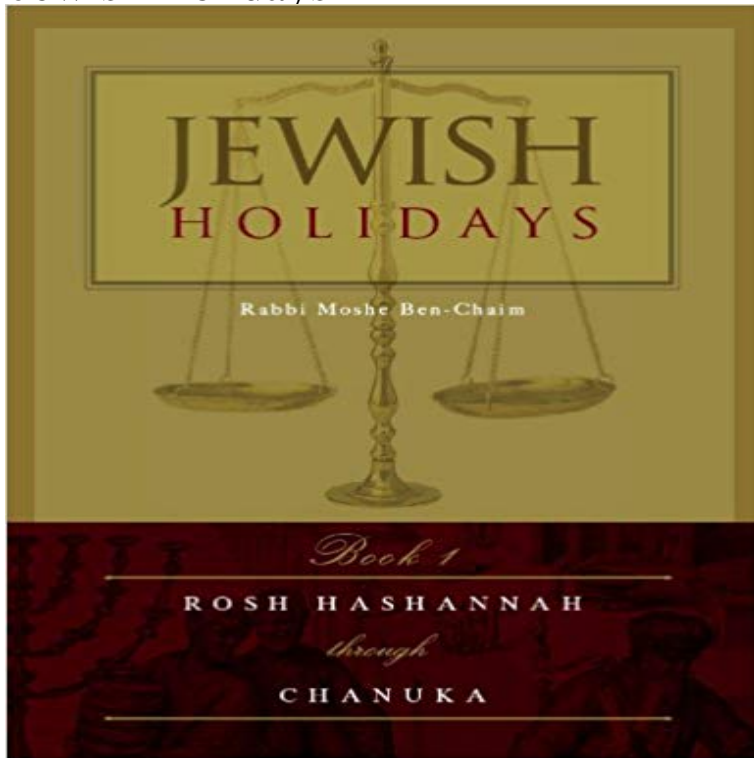


# Jewish Holidays
